WELCOME BACK TO A NEW 4-H CLUB YEAR

Each new year brings with it new plans, hopes and inspiration. As part of the 4-H Centennial Year, we would like to encourage you to make this the year of reaching out to each other in your clubs and groups as well as to others in your communities.

Create a buddy system for each new member and family that joins your group. There are a variety of ways you can support new members and families in your club and group.

- Setup a welcome committee that greets people at the door of your community and project meetings. Have the committee get the names of visitors and new members and families so that they can be introduced at the beginning of the meeting.
- Have everyone wear nametags so that new people and returning members can identify one another by name. Maybe the club can create its own special nametag for members to wear at the meetings, similar to business and civic groups.
- Encourage the club or group membership to welcome and make an effort to say hello to each other.
- Have someone identified for each new member to call and remind the new families when there is an upcoming community, project or committee meeting.
- Hold a special new parents' meeting to explain the different opportunities available and the "4-H Culture" so that they can be supportive.
- Provide a sheet with all the club or group contacts and meeting dates so that the member can contact others when he or she has questions.

4-H AGE POLICY

The levels of membership are an age based system with each level defined as follows:

PRIMARY: Must be 5 years old or in kindergarten as of January 1st of the Program year. The only approved animal projects for primary members are dogs, rabbits, rats, cats, poultry, cavies, mice, embryology, entomology, marine science, pygmy goats and therapeutic animal projects.

JUNIOR, INTERMEDIATE & SENIOR: Must be 9 years old or in 4th Grade by January 1st of the Program year.

For Home Schooled children, the age criteria *only* will apply.

The 4-H Program Year for San Diego County begins September 1 and ends August 31.

YOUTH IN ACTION/COMMUNITY SERVICE GRANTS FUNDED BY METLIFE FOUNDATION

OVER \$35,000 IN FUNDS TO GIVE OUT

Community service project grants of \$500 to \$1,500 are being offered to youth by the Metlife Foundation who take leadership roles and work with adult 4-H volunteer leaders and/or county Extension agents. Grants require youth teams to identify critical issues in their communities, develop activities to address these issues, and educate other young people and children on ways to model community service. Youth must be actively involved in writing the proposal and in program implementation. Collaborative efforts reflecting the diversity of the community are encouraged.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are an integral part of the 4-H Youth Development Program. The 4-H Program depends on volunteers to provide programs, projects and activities for youth and families throughout the county. 4-H Volunteers may be either adults or teens, and give their time, energy and resources for the benefit of children, families, and communities throughout San Diego. Essentially without volunteers the 4-H Club Program would not exist as we know it today.

The Volunteers in the San Diego County 4-H Program donate over 300,000 hours annually. 4-H Volunteers may be serving as Community Club Leaders, Project Leaders, Teen/Junior Leaders, Activity Advisors, Transportation, Enrollment, and in any other role needed to make 4-H a success. The 4-H Leaders can play a vital role in members' success. Non-parental adults who play significant, positive roles in youth's lives have proven to help them be successful and productive through adult-hood, (Brofenbrenner, 1986; Werner and Smith, 1982; Benson, 1997). The definition of mentor is a trusted counselor or guide. The success of a mentors' relationship with youth is influenced by the emotional support, tangible support and information supplied by the adult, (Blinn-Pike, 1998; Saito and Blyth, 1992).

Research has shown that the time adults give to youth is critical in helping them be successful (Jones-Brown and Henriques, 1998; Holland, 1996). 4-H Leaders give more time and make themselves more accessible to youth on the average compared to volunteers in other youth programs. Also, relationships between 4-H Leaders and Members tend to be sustained over a long period of time (years), which also contributes to the support of the members' successful development. Relationships between 4-H Members and Volunteers are successful because they tend to:

- Identify youth's interests and look at them seriously.
- Relate to the youth's experience
- Attempt to understand and work with the youth's family

Appreciation for the 4-H Volunteers needs to be expressed. Just as members appreciate recognition, it is important that members and families recognize the efforts of all 4-H Leaders and Volunteers. There are many ways to do this. You can show your appreciation in the form of a thoughtful card or letter, special recognition at 4-H events or a few thoughtful words of appreciation given by members and parents.

It is important that we all take time out to thank these individuals for their hard work and dedication.

AUGUST 5, 2002 EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

President Paulette Sauln called the meeting to order at 6:50 p.m. Present were: Paulette Sauln, Drew Middleton, Debbie McAdams, Scott Parker, Carmen Rodriguez, Lynanne Crippen and Kristina Byrne.

Paulette asked for a report from the Centennial 4-H Celebrates Youth Committee. Scott has the contract for the Organ Pavilion at Balboa Park for October 26, 2002. Drew indicated that the promotions brochure has been drafted; more photos are needed. Carmen will handle photos and print the brochure in color.

Paulette noted that each participant will need to provide their own shade for the event. 4-H will provide chairs and tables. Drew can get those from his church once the RSVP's are in and number of participants is known. We set a deadline of September 21, 2002, for RSVP's; invitation letters will go out to other youth organizations with the event information by mid-August.

We discussed sending a letter to all Clubs asking for their participation sponsoring a booth, with the goal being to have a well-rounded representation of Club activities. Paulette will forward Kristina a copy of the invitation letter and Kristina will draft the Club letter.

Paulette asked if we wanted to have a petting zoo. It was decided to have only small animals, dogs and reptiles. Scott will clear this with the City.

Debbie asked if we wanted to have a food booth. It was decided yes, but only drinks and pre-packaged snacks only, to avoid any safe food-handling issues.

Paulette discussed set-up and clean up. Volunteers are needed from 8 a.m. to 9 a.m. to set-up. Debbie suggested cleaning up over the course of the day to minimize clean up at the end of the event.

Carmen asked if we wanted to have entertainment. It might attract attention to the event. Carmen will look into this.

Scott stated that about 1 week prior to the event we need PR/publicity packets sent to local media.

Paulette reported that State Leadership Conference was all set; discussed airline reservations and t-shirts.

Concerning the Board's planning of events for 2002-2003, Scott suggested a retreat of sorts: a 3-hour meeting to plan, set goals and expectations followed by dinner. August 26, 2002, was set for this meeting, with the time to be decided later.

Debbie reported that a group of people involved with the National Conversation are involved in a project with the YMCA in Escondido on October 11-12, 2002. YMCA has located the facility and is developing the curriculum on the topic of Diversity. Debbie suggested that 4-H contribute to this event by providing \$200 for food and supplies. Kristina moved that the County Council allocate \$200 toward food and supplies for this event and to request that the youth involved give County Council a report afterward. Lynanne seconded the motion. Motion approved.

Kristina asked if the Board was again going to put on a Club Officer Day. Discussion supported this; Drew's church (where the event was held last year) did not like the date of September 28th, so he will inquire about October 5, 2002. A planning meeting for this event was set for August 12, 2002, at 6 p.m.

There being no further business, Kristina moved to adjourn the meeting, Drew seconded the motion, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:10 p.m.

CALIFORNIA 4-H WHEP TRAINING

WHEP stands for Wildlife Habitat Evaluation Program, a national 4-H program created to teach youth about wildlife ecology and management. It is designed to operate in the 4-H programs in each county, but could be adapted for any youth group format, formal or non-formal settings.

WHEP teaches youth the concepts of fish and wildlife management, about wildlife food, cover, space, other habitat requirements, and how they differ from one animal to another. Other concepts that are covered include: plant succession, vertical structure, migration, carrying capacity, aquatic dynamics, food webs, and fragmentation.
