# WELCOME BACK

Welcome back to a new 4-H Club year. Each new year brings with it new plans, hopes and inspiration. As part of the new year, we would like to encourage you to make this the year of reaching out to each other in your clubs and groups as well as to others in your communities.

Create a buddy system for each new member and family that joins your group. There are a variety of ways you can support new members and families in your club and group.

- Setup a welcome committee that greets people at the door of your community and project meetings. Have the committee get the names of visitors and new members and families so that they can be introduced at the beginning of the meeting.
- Have everyone wear nametags so that new people and returning members can identify one another by name. Maybe the club can create its own special nametag for members to wear at the meetings, similar to business and civic groups.
- Encourage the club or group membership to welcome and make an effort to say hello to each other.
- Have someone identified for each new member to call and remind the new families when there is an upcoming community, project or committee meeting.
- Hold a special new parents' meeting to explain the different opportunities available and the "4-H Culture" so that they can be supportive.
- Provide a sheet with all the club or group contacts and meeting dates so that the member can contact others when he or she has questions.

#### **4-H AGE POLICY**

The levels of membership are an age based system with each level defined as follows:

**PRIMARY:** Must be 5 years old or in kindergarten as of January 1st of the Program year. The only approved animal projects for primary members are dogs, rabbits, rats, cats, poultry, cavies, mice, embryology, entomology, marine science, pygmy goats and therapeutic animal projects.

**JUNIOR, INTERMEDIATE & SENIOR:** Must be 9 years old or in 4<sup>th</sup> Grade by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the program year and may continue in the program until the end of the calendar year in which they become 19 years of age.

Home Schooled children are to enroll based on their chronological age as of January 1.

# 4-H, FFA, Grange & Independent Exhibitor Info

To maintain the fine statewide cooperation that now exists between Cooperative Extension, high school vocational agriculture departments, the California State Grange, and the California Department of Food and Agriculture's Division of Fairs and Expositions, it is essential that all staff members, leaders, and advisors in these organizations be informed of the joint policy governing projects and enrollment of youth who participate in fairs and exhibitions as members of the 4-H, FFA, Grange or as independent exhibitors. We hope that all leaders, staff, teachers/advisors, fair and exposition officials, and members/exhibitors will observe these policies so that the best interests of all organizations and the member/exhibitors is served educationally.

None of the organizations, publicly or privately, have the right to determine the extent to which a member can participate in projects in either organization providing the minimum requirements are met for supervised project work. The member and parents should determine what projects should be undertaken in each organization or independently. Neither the agricultural instructor, the 4-H leader, or the Grange leader should discourage the member from following the choice agreed upon by the member and parents.

It is agreed that when an individual belongs to more than one organization, or exhibits as an independent, he/she must carry a different project in each organization/independent. To further clarify this policy, when a member maintains projects in 4-H, FFA, Grange or as an independent; the projects may not be in the same kind of livestock or crop. For example, an FFA beef project in vocational agriculture and a sheep project in 4-H would be acceptable; but a beef breeding project in FFA and a beef market project in 4-H would not be acceptable -- even if the animals were of different breeds. Beef, dairy cattle, and veal projects are recognized by the San Diego County 4-H Office as different projects. A member of an FFA chapter, Grange, or 4-H unit (club, group, etc.), or independent exhibitor may transfer projects from one organization/independent to another only once during a calendar year.

To be able to show a project at an endorsed fair and exposition or other sponsored event, it must be owned and supervised according to the following requirements:

Poultry - must be owned for not less than 30 days and be enrolled in the project for not less than 60 days.

Rabbits - must be owned for not less than 30 days and enrolled in the project for not less than 60 days.

All Feeder and Breeding Animals (except rabbits and poultry) - must be owned and supervised for not less than 60 days.

Market sheep, swine, veal and goats - must be owned and supervise for not less than 60 days.

Market beef - must be owned and supervised for not less than 120 days.

Horses – must be owned/leased and supervised for not less than 120 days.

We are in general agreement that members are expected to care for, prepare for show, and exhibit their own animals while at the fair or live-stock show. However because of the educational nature of livestock shows it is appropriate on occasion for parents, leaders, or other youth eligible to exhibit at that show to provide assistance. Assistance should always be given only when the exhibitor is present and actively engaged.

We are opposed to inter-organization competition. We agree that separate classes for 4-H, FAA, Grange, and independents should be maintained and strengthened. However, we recognize that in some circumstances combined classes may be appropriate. When combined classes are established, that decision should be reached with input and agreement by 4-H, FFA, Grange and independent representatives participating in the affected show. This was entered into by 4-H, FFA, Grange and the California Department of Food and Agriculture, Division of Fairs and Expositions at the end of 1998.

Please note that for the purposes of the San Diego County 4-H office "supervision" in the preceding information means: "A 4-H member in good standing who is officially enrolled with the county 4-H office in the project they are showing under. The 4-H member must fulfill any club or project requirements expected of all club and project members for fair participation."

Please read and understand the fair rules section for every fair you plan on attending to make sure you are in compliance with this policy.

## **National 4-H Conference**

The National 4-H Conference is held at the National 4-H Center, Chevy Chase, Maryland in the spring of each year. Eight youth and two adult delegates are selected to represent California 4-H. The conference focuses on creating recommendations to help improve the 4-H Program.

After a year without our annual Junior Leadership Camp due to the wildfires, this year should be a great event. There will be sessions to help members build their leadership skills, learn about new 4-H projects and opportunities and meet other 4-H members from throughout San Diego County. It has been many years since we have had an opportunity to stay at the Cuyamaca Outdoor Camp so don't miss out. The program will start on Friday evening with the Opening Assembly and end on Sunday after lunch and a Closing Assembly.

Eligible delegates should be in 6th, 7th and 8th grades.

Session presenters and counselors must be in the 9th grade or above.

Chaperones must be at least 25 years of age and must be approved 4-H volunteers.

Costs: \$55.00 for delegates (includes sleeping facilities, food for three days and materials)

\$40.00 for session leaders/ counselors & chaperones

Applications are available from your 4-H Community Club Leader and in the newsletter. Register as a club group through your community club leader. Clubs must turn in delegate applications with chaperone applications together as a group, along with one club check, to be accepted. Session applications are due to the County 4-H Office by October 8TH. All camp delegates and chaperone applications are due by club in the 4-H Office no later than October 25, 2004.

Teen members who want to lead sessions must fill out the session application(s) and attend a planning and audition meeting. No exceptions! Session topics should be new and have activities in them. Contact your community club leader or check your 4-H newsletter for applications.

This conference is open to all 4-H members in grades 6, 7, 8 only. A member does not have to be a Junior Leader to attend. Chaperones must be a minimum of 25 years of age. The Conference is organized and conducted by the San Diego County 4-H Teen Council. Delegates will participate in sessions/workshops/activities that will help them develop leadership skills and increase their knowledge of 4-H!

WHEN: Friday- Sunday, November 5-7

CHECK IN: 5 p.m. -8 p.m., Friday, November 5

CHECK OUT: 12:00 noon, Sunday, November 7 (Cannot leave before noon)

Delegates will not be allowed to leave the conference for any reason once they have checked in.

If you cannot stay, please do not register -NO EXCEPTIONS. No late check-in.

WHERE: Cuyamaca Outdoor Camp

COST: \$55.00 Includes Friday night snacks, 3 meals on Saturday, and breakfast Sunday.

\$40.00 Session Leaders and Chaperones

PRESENTATIONS: Members giving presentation must fill out a session application and attend a mandatory audition. No exceptions! Sessions should be new, with no repeats from the previous two years. Session applications are due by Friday, October 8th. All Camp and chaperone applications are due by October 25th at 5:00 p.m. in the County 4-H Office.

ACCOMMODATIONS: Cabins with bunk beds; central showers and restrooms and a dining hall. Bring a sleeping bag, pillow, and warm blankets. All delegates will be assigned to a cabin and chaperone. Please request only one roommate. Requests for more then one roommate or for clubs cannot be honored and will not be forwarded to the registration committee. Every attempt is made to honor roommate requests, however, it is usually impossible to honor all requests. To improve your chances, have the person you request as a roommate, request you as a roommate. Delegates are assigned to cabins and will not be reassigned at the camp. If, for medical reasons, a delegate must be roomed with a specific chaperone or with the camp nurse, write the chaperone¹s name or nurse in the roommate request space and attach a brief explanation signed by a parent, guardian or adult leader. Requests for both a delegate roommate and a chaperone cannot be honored. Delegates are expected to participate in the assigned sessions. Part of the learning process for the conference comes from meeting new people and sharing ideas and experiences!

DRESS: Warm camp clothes -jeans, T -shirts, sweatshirts, jackets, comfortable shoes. Casual, but warm. There will be a pizza party and dance on Saturday evening. Bring towels, washcloths, etc.

TRANSPORTATION: All participants must provide their own transportation to and from the conference.


